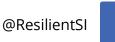

Resilient Southern Illinois (RSI) is one of three initiatives of the statewide nonprofit the Partnership for Resilience (P4R). RSI and P4R work to improve academic, health, and social outcomes for children by fostering trauma-responsive schools and effective family, school, health, and community partnerships. RSI is a multi-year effort in the southern Illinois region and strives to spread awareness and meet the needs of children impacted by childhood trauma and toxic stress. The initiative includes resources, tools, and networking opportunities for educators and other personnel in member districts that are designed to support the needs of the "whole child." Tools and resources focus on primary care and wellness, trauma and behavioral health, and family and community engagement.

Throughout the year, P4R and RSI offered virtual SEL workshops including Motivating Students with High Interest, Choice, and Motivation and Equity, Social Justice Learning Through Biographies, Videos, and Trade Books. RSI has offered seven asynchronous book studies since the summer of 2021, and each has been a huge success with a total of 233 registrants. Asynchronous book studies offer professional development opportunities for early childhood educators, K-12 educators, social workers, and counselors. They allow participants the flexibility to discuss a book virtually and respond to discussion prompts within an assignment timeframe.

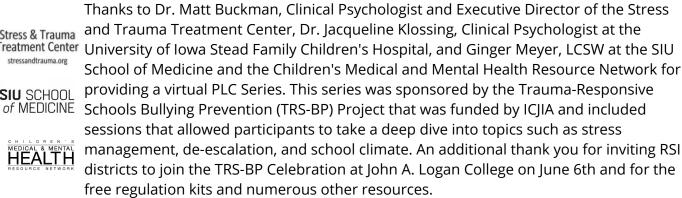

SHAPE, TRS-IA, and ACTION PLANS

During the 2021-2022 school year, RSI supported district resilience teams with the implementation of the Trauma-Responsive Schools-Implementation Assessment (TRS-IA) as a part of the action planning process. The TRS-IA is an evidence-informed self-assessment that can quickly and efficiently identify trauma responsive programming and policy domains of strengths, as well as areas with greater room for improvement. STAFF BELIEFS

The annual educator beliefs survey was distributed to all staff members in RSI districts during the fall. The newly updated beliefs survey included 44 items that targeted knowledge of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), trauma-sensitive schools, social-emotional learning, parent-community engagement, staff comfort level in developing a trauma-sensitive climate, and effective implementation of a trauma-sensitive climate. Participants were asked to rate each item on a five-point scale from strongly disagree to strongly agree. The results were shared with each district and used to guide action plans and priorities.

























REACH INITIATIVE

Many RSI districts and schools across Illinois are joining the Resilience Education to Advance Community Healing (REACH) Initiative through their Regional Office of Education. The REACH model builds schools' capacity to recognize the signs and symptoms of trauma and to meet the social-emotional and mental wellness needs of students and staff. REACH includes 7 SEL Hubs throughout the state and offers communities of practice, professional development, and support to participating districts. REACH is collaborative effort between the Illinois State Board of Education, the Center for Childhood Resilience at Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago, Illinois Department of Public Health, the Partnership for Resilience, and the Stress and Trauma Treatment Center. CHILDREN'S CABINETS

An exciting collaborative partnership with Southern Illinois Coalition for Children and Families (SICCF), RSI, and the City of Carbondale is taking place. The Carbondale Community Cabinet for Children and Youth is working to bring families and stakeholders together to plan for a community that encourages children and families to thrive. After almost a year of planning, the 19 member cabinet is ready to officially launch in August 2022. The cabinet includes cross sector agency representation and families from different school districts reflecting the rich diversity of the community. Congratulations to Johnson County for your efforts to create a children's cabinet built upon the existing foundation of the Johnson County Safety Committee. The cabinet has expanded its work to include early childhood education and care by creating a corresponding committee that focuses on early childhood. School administrators serve as the steering committee to ensure both committees are working in alignment and improving the coordination of both services and resources. This will allow Johnson County to better address the unmet needs of children and youth through the collaboration of public and private stakeholders.





Early Childhood Initiative



RSI would like to welcome Colleen McLaughlin to the team as an Early Childhood Education Consultant. She joined our team in January 2022. Colleen has worked in the field of Early Care and Education for more than 25 years. She applied at a childcare center for a part-time job when she was in college and fell in love with the field. Over the years, she has worn many hats as a teacher of infants through school-age children both in childcare and public schools. She has also worked as a state assessor, program director, professional development provider, and adjunct faculty. Colleen earned her BA in ECE from Columbia College Chicago and her MSed in ECE from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale. She is a member of the ilAEYC governing board, the Southern Illinois Coalition for Children & Families as well as the Southern Illinois Early Childhood Action Team (SIECAT).

RSI received \$10,000 in funding for our early childhood initiative from the Illinois Children's Healthcare Foundation through the Building Companionate Communities Grant managed by Centerstone. This funding supported...

- A book study over Managing Emotional Mayhem: The Five Steps for Self-Regulation by Dr. Becky Bailey. Book study participants working in a RSI member districts or SDA #16 were eligible for reimbursement of the book cost.
- Virtual professional development opportunities by Elizabeth Priller Consulting.
- A Social-Emotional Resource Lending Library for programs/providers that will be housed at Child Care Resource and Referral (CCR&R) at John A. Logan College. Stay tuned for more details!







In October, all Pre-K staff in Johnston City and Herrin participated in *I'm a Pre-K Teacher: What's Your Superpower?* presented by Ginger Meyer, LCSW with the SIU School of Medicine and the Children's Medical and Mental Health Resource Network. This training was specially designed for Pre-K teachers to learn the art and science behind co-regulation. Practical examples and hands-on resources helped teachers bolster their superpowers of connection to create classrooms where learning can flourish.



Early Childhood Initiative



Pre-K staff at Northside Primary in Herrin finished up the *CARE in the Classroom* training this fall, which is a trauma-informed set of skills that can be used by any adult in any setting to improve attachments and strengthen relationships while reducing behavior concerns and increasing compliance. Thanks to all who participated, and a special thank you to Dr. Buckman from the Stress and Trauma Treatment Center for providing this training.

RSI would like to thank CCR&R for your partnership and working to spread awareness on the importance of trauma-responsive practices in early childhood education.

In the past year, RSI 2.0 hosted in-person and virtual professional development sessions at CCR&R, Super Saturday, John A. Logan's early childhood courses, and at childcare centers. Some of the session titles include: *An Introduction to ACEs and Resilience, Social and Emotional Learning for Infants and Toddlers, Understanding Executive Function in Young Children,* and a movie screening and facilitated discussion over *Resilience: The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope.*

A lot has been different this school year, but one thing that remains the same is the level of commitment that Partnership for Resilience has to you, our partners, through our vision and mission. Beyond working with your Resilience Teams, providing professional development, introducing parent mentors to your schools, and connecting students with physical and behavioral health resources, we are collaborating in other spaces to positively impact the amazing work that you are doing. Because of our collective work in developing trauma-responsive schools in Illinois, other stakeholders invited us specifically to partner with them this year.

Whole Child Task Force: Partnership for Resilience is a member of the Whole Child Task Force (https://www.isbe.net/wholechild), appointed by the State Superintendent of Education. The Whole Child Task Force was created for the purpose of establishing an equitable, inclusive, safe, and supportive environment in all schools for every student in this State.

Illinois Children's Mental Health Plan (ICMHP) Steering Committee: Partnership for Resilience was requested to be a part of the Steering Committee (https://www.icmhp.org/our-work/childrens-mental-health-plan/), and to co-chair one of the workgroups which is comprised of system experts, the ICMHP Interim Chair, ICMHP Director, and ICMHP staff. ICMHP is charged with developing and monitoring a plan to build comprehensive and coordinated mental health services, programs, and supports for Illinois children and their families. ICMHP and the State of Illinois are embarking on the process to develop a new Children's Mental Health Plan to improve the overall well-being of all Illinois youth and families.

Resilience Education to Advance Community Healing Initiative (REACH Initiative) Partner: Partnership for Resilience serves as a program management partner for the 2-year Resilience Education to Advance Community Healing (REACH) Statewide Initiative (https://www.isbe.net/Lists/News/NewsDisplay.aspx?ID=1346). In this role Partnership for Resilience serves as the lead of the program's co-development of the REACH Statewide Communities of Practice Business Model along with Lurie Children's Center for Childhood Resilience, facilitator of Communities of Practice, and management of the Community of Practice Business Model Implementation. The Partnership for Resilience also serves as a key member of the program leadership team for the areas of the Regional Office of Education Social Emotional Learning Hub Training of Trainers and the REACH Designation Model.

Harvard Graduate School of Education: The Partnership for Resilience is a community of practice within the EdRedesign Lab By All Means Initiative at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. (https://edredesign.org/who-we-are). The EdRedesign Lab launched By All Means initiative in 2016 to rethink education and child development systems in partnership with the Partnership for Resilience and 8 other communities in the United States.
